## Fall & Winter Safety!

## Know the Weather:

CE-SOHMS - Capability Objective: #1 & #5

- Listen to the forecast ahead of your planned event or activities.
- Don't be afraid of stopping an activity due to poor weather conditions.
- It is better to be safe than sorry because a planned event hadn't to take place.
- Plan accordingly if you are going to hike, ride a bike over a long distance.
- Days are not as long now, and the heat of the day may only be 3 or 4 hours around noon.
- Temperatures can drop faster than your body can react sometimes.
- Just because it is warm in the daytime doesn't mean the weather will stay warm at night.
- Bring along extra clothing and food in a backpack in case your plans are stalled.

### Be a knowledgeable Driver: CE-SOHMS - Capability Objective: #3 & #6

- Leaves on roadways might become slick overnight especially after rain.
- Use caution when driving or braking on roads that have spot where leaves have fallen.
- Wear sunglasses to minimize the glare and clean the windshield on the inside.
- Start your mornings earlier than normal frost may be on your windshield and other windows.
- If driving on a long route, start earlier than normal and stay on main roads.
- Don't always keep up with the fastest vehicle on the road.
- You are not in a hurry, slow down and think safety.
- Minimize the hazards on the road, pay attention to driving.

### Maintain your Vehicle:

#### CE-SOHMS - Capability Objective: #2 & #4

- Get your POV checked out by a mechanic before it becomes cold.
- Carry additional fluids for your POV in case you need to use in emergency situations.
- Perform a visual check of your POV before driving on a longer than normal trip.
- Ensure your heater, defroster and fan are working properly before you set out on the road.
- Wait until your heater or defroster air becomes warm before setting out on your trip.
- Check your tires to see if they are serviceable.
- If you happen to break down, crack your window if you turn your heater on for warm air.
